3. MEET OUR SENIOR RESEARCH FELLOW, MERIL ANTONY



We are pleased to announce the hiring of Doctoral Student and CLiME Senior Research Fellow, Meril Antony. Meril is currently working on updating the Displacement Risk Indicators Matrix (DRIM) using census-based research. She is also assisting Professor David Troutt, as part of the Equitable Growth Advisory Commission, in conducting literature reviews in analyzing the returns on public investment of redevelopment subsidies and incentives and measuring displacement.

4. MID-SUMMER LAUNCH OF NEWARK'S EQUITABLE GROWTH ADVISORY COMMISSION

In an effort to protect Newark residents from being priced out of existing housing as the city enjoys a surge in development, the City of Newark announced the creation of an Equitable Growth Advisory Commission at the end of 2018, an idea first formally introduced by Rutgers Law School Professor and CLiME Director David Troutt, who was



approved by the council to serve on the Commission on July 9.

The Commission is charged with listening to residents' concerns about economic inclusion and giving advice to the city on planning and land use laws, housing policies and business development. Members will serve two-year terms, and the Commission will officially launch mid-summer.

4. NEWARK'S "RIGHT TO COUNSEL" ORDINANCE

Indigent residents of Newark facing eviction can soon get free legal help through the city's right-to-counsel ordinance, which was recommended in 2017 and spelled out in a memorandum by the Rutgers Center for Law, Inequality and Metropolitan Equity (CLiME).

The City of Newark adopted the right-to-counsel ordinance, based in part on CLiME's recommendation, in December 2018 and began implementing it this spring.
